

From the director...

The 1930s in America were a time of remarkable contradiction and complexity. Bordered loosely on one end by Black Tuesday of the Great Depression and on the other by the bombing of Pearl Harbor, America was teetering between big government programs spearheaded by FDR to yank us out of the depths of the Depression, and simmering, soon to be boiling, events across the Atlantic and Pacific. "You Can't Take It With You" was thus greeted with relief as perfect escapist fare, diverting audiences from the harsh realities just outside the doors of the Booth Theatre.

Winner of the 1937 Pulitzer Prize, George S. Kaufman and Moss Hart's play isn't simply a clever distraction from bad times, though. There is an undeniable spirit of life and philosophy flowing through the Vanderhof clan: one of living life to the fullest, and enjoying the pageant of life as it unfolds, even the most difficult parts.

We produced this play ten years ago at Gunn Theatre, just two months after September 11th 2001. We found we were producing a piece of surprisingly important theatre then, lightening hearts and strengthening spirits. And now in our current revival we're once again living in interesting times. Unstable world markets, a polarized electorate, governmental shifts, and simmering (soon to be boiling?) events across the seas threaten to keep our brows furrowed... But as Grandpa says, "It's wonderful what some people go through, isn't? And still keep kind of gay." Or, to quote the great American composer Irving Berlin (who was born in Russia in 1888):

There may be trouble ahead

But while there's music and moonlight and love and romance,

Let's face the music and dance.
