Opening Night Gala, November 13 at 6:45 p.m. \$15 November 14, 15, 20, 21, & 22 at 8 p.m. \$8 November 19 matinee at 3:30 p.m. \$4 Gunn Studio Theater 780 Arastradero Road A rthur Miller's "The Crucible" opened on Broadway fifty years ago at the Martin Beck Theatre, and although not the enormous success in New York that his previous "Death of a Salesman" (1949) was, it gained respectable reviews and audience reactions. But "The Crucible" has really achieved its remarkable success as one of the most frequently produced plays in the world, as well as part of the canon of widely read and taught pieces of dramatic literature in high school curricula across the country.

Set against the backdrop of 1692 Salem, Massachusetts, we are immediately introduced to a theocratic Puritan society suffused with fear and suspicion where a mad hunt for witches actually took place resulting in the hanging of many innocent people. Miller was liberal in his fictionalization of those actual events. Miller himself said, "Nobody can start to write a tragedy and hope to make it reportage what I was doing was writing a fictional story about an important theme." Miller was clearly writing in response to Senator McCarthy and the House Un-American Activities Committee's crusade against supposed communist sympathizers taking place in the early fifties. In fact they soon became known as the communist "witch hunts."

In fifty years, so much has changed in this country, and of course so much has not. As with any strong piece of literature, the themes addressed in this play are eternal and transcend both Salem and McCarthy. Is the hysteria born of the fear of whatever devil currently threatens us (witches, communism, terrorism) ultimately more damaging to our society than that which brings it about? At what point is protection of society more important than individual liberties? The play is also the simple story of a very human protagonist struggling to do what is right and live a moral life amidst hypocrisy and pretense.

Our world continues to become more complex, and we are certainly living in increasingly "interesting times." It is with joy and appreciation of the ability to present what has become a classic American piece of dramatic literature that we thank you for joining us tonight.

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
