

THE ARTS ARE BASIC

Webster defines basic as "of, relating to, or forming the base or essence." How, then does that apply to the arts? Exposure to the arts modifies student behavior in a positive, constructive way. For example, wherever Arts programs (which includes art, music, dance, drama/theatre) are instituted in an educational program, the incidence of vandalism and lack of concern for the school environment diminish. There is an increase in social awareness and self worth.

If we want our children to learn how to respond to the world, we must give them opportunities to practice responding. Creative movement, dance, theatre games-all teach that. If we want a child to learn how to listen, music and ear-training will do that. The very basis of self-expression in a disciplined way is the heart and soul of the Arts.

Without the use of the creative process, most of the modern technological advances would not have been made. Creative response to a problem helped put the first man on the moon. Einstein took a nap each day to allow his creative side to overcome the methodical, factual side and thereby find solutions to his problem.

I have seen young people who had trouble reading overcome that disability because they were motivated by wanting to be in a play. The Arts teach practical skills, problem-solving, open doors to vocational opportunities, help develop physical and vocal abilities, heighten perception, teach appreciation of culture, language, and life style diversities, give students practice in becoming competent citizens who vote with intelligence.

In the coming years these qualities are going to determine the direction of our civilization. We need young people who can creatively find ways to solve our energy and economic problems. We need young people who are inspired to reach for the higher things in life, to help solve the inequality in our world. What a better place to start educating and developing the creative, mature individual than in our public schools. After all, isn't that the responsibility we must face as parents and educators?


