

William Inge's first stage success was "Come Back Little Sheba," in 1950; he was later awarded the Pulitzer prize for "Picnic" in 1953. He went on to write "Bus Stop" (1955), "The Dark at the Top of the Stairs" (1957), and "Loss of Roses" (1959).
