Charles Cohen (The Actor's Nightmare)

Anton Chekhov wrote during a time of political and social upheaval in Russsia, and his plays reflect the growing dissatisfaction with the old system. Although "The Boor" is primarily a comic sketch, it does show a selection of characters struggling with the traditional limitations of class and gender. Watching this piece, you might want to think about the following questions. How does each character change during the play? Which character's actions most dramatically transcend his or her traditionally defined role? What role does pride play in motivating the characters? And of course, consider the similarities between this turn of the century Russian drama, and the drama that takes place all around us, here and now.

Jennifer Pratt (The Boor)

The key to watching Vonnegut's masterpiece is to clear your mind, relax, and let yourself be pulled into the magic created by two people and a black stage. "Newt looked closely at Catherine's face. To her consternation, she realized that what she had said was true, that a woman couldn't hide love. Newt was seeing love now. And he did what he had to do." It's rad.

Relly Brandman (Long Walk to Forever)

Naomi represents the inner personality we all long to show to the world, a person untouched by constantly advancing society. The one who can shamelessly say: "Shut up!" to her daughter-in-law. The one who is not afraid to ask your name one more time. She makes no pretenses, puts up no façade of "being proper."

Naomi teaches us that it is all right to let out a scream once in a while just because. It is okay to be your own, natural self and admit sometimes that you don't understand. "You can be a chicken if you want to." -K. Kej
