Thank you for coming to see *The Winter's Tale*, which is, most simply, a play about the healing power of Time and of Love. This is not a well-known play, nor is it always a simple experience for the viewer (the synopsis later on in the program ought to help a bit!). One of the late "romances" (written 1610-11), this is a Shakespeare fully confident in his skills as a storyteller, and perhaps not feeling the need to patronize his audiences. So, tighten your seatbelt and enjoy this wondrous strange tale. At the top of his game, Mr. Shakespeare trusted his audiences to ride the narrative waves along with him!

Contrasting themes abound as we travel between the two worlds of Sicilia and Bohemia: a short list might include winter/summer, town/country, courtier/peasant, death/birth, guilt/innocence and jealousy/constancy... (bonus points awarded after the play for more pairs!). The Yuan Dynasty of 13<sup>th</sup> Century China was our inspiration for Sicilia, while Bohemia is more Mongolian, the land beyond the Great Wall.

Unlike, say, Romeo and Juliet which starts as a delightful comedy and then with Mercutio's death becomes increasingly dark, this play does just the opposite, and from tragic beginnings turns to a pastoral comedy right around the time poor Antigonus "exits, pursued by a bear" (with that most treasured of all Shakespeare's stage directions!). While the first half of the play is as dire as any in Shakespeare, the second half shows the power of love, the importance of following your heart, and that it is indeed possible to find forgiveness. "Sir, you have done enough, and have performed a saint-like sorrow." (Cleomenes, V,i)

So this play is a testament to the complicated reality that, while it's true tragedies happen, people do terrible things, and life can be very hard, at the same time redemption, reconciliation, and forgiveness are still possible. During these turbulent times, we could do worse than try to take this lesson home with us...

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

The Story of The Winter's Tale (pay attention!):

Leontes, King of Sicilia, with his wife Hermione, has for nine months been host to his friend Polixenes, King of Bohemia. Suspecting that his wife has been unfaithful and is carrying Polixenes' child, Leontes asks Camillo to poison Polixenes but instead Camillo and Polixenes escape. Leontes imprisons Hermione for adultery and treason. Their young son, Mamillius, upset at his mother's plight, falls sick.

In prison the queen gives birth to a daughter. When Paulina brings the baby to Leontes in hope of changing his mind, he believes it a bastard, and commands Antigonus to take the baby abroad and abandon it on a 'desert shore.'

Leontes sends to Apollo's oracle at Delphos to find the truth of the matter. Hermione is brought to trial where the oracle reveals that she is innocent. Leontes denies the oracle but the Gods' anger is swift-immediately a servant brings tragic news. Too late Leontes realizes his faults: the queen collapses in court, is carried out and Paulina brings the news that she has died. The first half ends when Antigonus abandons the baby on the shore of Bohemia, is eaten by a bear, and the baby is found by a shepherd and his son.

Time introduces the second half of the play, telling us that 16 years have passed, and, in Bohemia as chance would have it, the baby, raised by shepherds and called Perdita, is in love with Florizel, Polixenes' son. Polixenes tells Camillo (now his right-hand man) that he has heard his son is visiting a shepherd's daughter and the two men agree to visit the shepherd in disguise to find out what is going on. We meet Autolycus, a travelling petty thief, and see him con the young shepherd.

At the shepherd's sheep-shearing festival Polixenes intervenes when Florizel and Perdita are to be betrothed. However, Florizel determines to ignore his father and give up his inheritance for his love. Camillo advises them to flee to Sicilia and Autoloycus, overhearing this plan, decides to take the shepherds along on the prince's boat.

Florizel and Perdita arrive in Sicilia where they are welcomed by the still grieving King Leontes - but Polixenes, warned of their flight by Camillo, pursues them. However, we learn that the old shepherd tells his story and reveals Perdita's true identity. Leontes is reunited with his daughter and after 16 years the oracle's cryptic message is fulfilled...
